About the CEP

The Community Language Program (CLP) is a unique and integral part of the TESOL and Applied Linguistics Programs at Teachers College, Columbia University. It provides English as a second language and foreign language instruction to adult learners of diverse nationalities and backgrounds. In addition, the CLP serves as an on-site language education lab in which TESOL and Applied Linguistics faculty and students enrolled in the programs teach the courses and use the CLP as a setting for empirical inquiry. Additionally, assessment and program evaluation play a major part in our program as well. Thus, we encourage observation and classroom research and want people to use it as a tool for learning.

About this Class

This is an integrated skills Intermediate 2 course. Students will practice and combine the skills of speaking, listening, reading, writing, and grammar through a range of activities. The class will focus on use of language in real, meaningful situations and tasks in order to benefit students' lives and work in the real world.
